Brilliant Club





Leigh Beck Nursery visit



Tuesday 4th July was a great day for Child Development students who visited Leigh Beck Nursery. Students got the opportunity to watch children play live in the local early years setting. They were completely immersed into the situation; playing with sand, building towers and having their hair brushed by 3 and 4 year olds. This is just a snippet of the fun had by the current Year 10. However, there was a serious reason for this exciting time out of their lessons, coursework! This



year's assessment focus is observing 3 & 4 year old children in physical development. The Year 10 will now use the observations to evaluate their findings and compare them with the expected development norms. They will also plan play activities that will support and extend the children's learning and development. Mrs Smart was very proud of the conduct shown by the Year 10 students and has enjoyed listening to all their stories. One child described the students as police officers because they were in Uniform.



Maths

We've had a busy Summer term with students meeting our new staff Mrs Stoner, Mr Vandal and Mr Thompson. Our students have warmed to their new teachers quickly and are enjoying their lessons where they have been studying a range of topics including probability, sequences, indices, and transformations. The students have also been introduced to a new homework platform called SPARX Maths which will be replacing Hegarty Maths in September. SPARX Maths is a

piece of software that personalises each student's homework to match our scheme of learning and each individual student's ability level making homework more accessible for all. Years 7, 8 and 9 have enjoyed using SPARX with many students saying they prefer it to Hegarty Maths. Year 10 will be introduced to the new programme over the last few weeks of term ready to start fresh in September.

Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Award 2023

On Friday 16th June, 18 enthusiastic Year 10 students met at Danbury outdoors, excited for their Bronze expedition to begin. Walking for two days, approximately 6 hours each day, is a considerable challenge, but I am pleased to say all groups excelled in this area. They demonstrated excellent map reading skills and worked well as a team, which are crucial aspects of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

Arriving at the campsite with plenty of time to set up their luxury tents and cook their meals shows their efficiency and organisation. The students even had enough energy to play a giant game of hide and seek!!



The next day, the students embarked on their return journey with lighter backpacks and high spirits. Once again, all teams successfully navigated their way back to Danbury Park, demonstrating their competent map reading skills.

Receiving positive feedback during the assessor's debrief and being told that they had all passed the expedition section of their award, was a moment of great pride and accomplishment for the students. This experience will not only contribute to their personal growth and self-confidence but also serve as a memorable milestone in their journey towards completing the Duke of Edinburgh's Bronze award.






On Friday 26th May 2023, our library team was selected to take part in the livestream at Hay Literary Festival where students were able to take part in different groups to watch authors. Key Stage 3 students were able to take part in workshops with authors to understand how to bring their own creative writing to life with inspiring interactive

activities and conversations. Hay Festival is the world's leading festival of ideas, bringing readers and writers together to look at new fiction and non-fiction texts, whilst offering insights and debate around significant global issues. Our students took part in the following events:

Bear Grylls in conversation with Tori James about his talk on his book 'Mind Fuel'



In this, talk Year 7 students were able to hear from Bear Grylls, one of the world's most recognised adventurers, who spoke about daily tips to help to build mental resilience. He used ideas from his survival experience to share the principles that have helped him overcome fear, develop a positive mindset and break through the obstacles that limit success in everyday life. He was also able to have a look at eight key themes – wisdom, battles, motivation, courage, relationships, self-care, spirituality and determination. Our students can take out 'Mind Fuel' from the Mental Health section of our school library.

Dr. Maggie Aderin-Pocock MBE and her talk on 'Am I Made of Stardust?'

In this session, Year 9 students were able to talk to Dr Maggie about her pioneering work in space. She is a space scientist who was appointed MBE for her services to science and education. She is committed to inspire new generations of astronauts, engineers and scientists by demonstrating her understanding of the universe, the solar system and space exploration. We are also lucky enough to have her text 'Am I Made of Stardust' in our school library for any student to read.






Dr. Shini Somara and her talk on 'Engineers Making A Difference'

In this talk, Year 8 were able to think about the difference they can all make in their educational journey, from battling the impacts of climate change to unlocking the mysteries of fusion energy; the inventors, technicians, scientists and tech entrepreneurs that are

making a difference and are part of the exciting and diverse world of engineering. Engineers are problem solvers and innovators, and embarking on an engineering career will give us all a chance to tackle some of the world's toughest challenges. This also had a link to British Science Week 2023 and the students were able to find out about other inventions and how human needs are looking at more and more innovators in society. We have many books in the library for students to take home to read in our sciences section of the library, as well as our new books section.






Laura Dockrill and her talk on 'You are a Story'

All students were able to take part during their breaktime in understanding the key theme of 'you are enough'. Laura Dockrill, who is a YA Book Prize shortlisted author and Brit School Performing Arts graduate, delivered a superb masterclass on how you can play in your imagination to find your own

voice and use it to express yourself and become a creative writing superstar. This event really influenced our Creative Minds club, who on Monday, Break Two every week meet up and create their own stories which by the end of the year they hope will be published and printed in our school library for the whole school to read.



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The Power of Voice

During this programme, our students are able to empower themselves by telling the stories that matter to them, harnessing the power of writing to share experiences with a real audience and drive change.

The National Literacy Trust arranged on Friday 30th June 2023 to work with the professional author of Kuchenga, who is a writer, journalist and speaker with work on many media platforms including British Vogue and Netflix. Our Year 7 and 8 students were asked to develop techniques and skills such as independent research, exploring different perspectives, communicating ideas, writing independently and editorial examination of their work.

Our students were encouraged to explore their civic identities and use their own voices to reach a

specific audience through selecting a form for their piece. As a result of this programme, the group of Year 7 and 8 students will be encouraged to explore the use of their home languages and dialects as part of our Young Writers team. The Reading Team at Cornelius were able to help our youngsters have their opinions and voices heard, and to share the stories that matter to them, and to drive change in our school and community through the power of writing.

This will continue to link to our Creative Minds enrichment programme that is run by two of our students Jayden and Hollie on a Monday, Break Two in our school library, all students are welcome to attend and continue to develop the power of their voices.

Lit in Colour Pioneer



We are excited to announce that Cornelius Vermuyden School has been selected as one of 100 secondary schools and colleges in England, to be a Lit in Colour Pioneer with Penguin, The Runnymede Trust and Pearson Exam Board.

As part of the Pioneers programme, we have received extensive guidance and resources for teaching English Literature set texts by Black, Asian and minority ethnic writers, to ensure that our school has inclusion and diversity at the forefront of our curriculum and learning. We are lucky enough to have been able to get free access to:

- Copies of the chosen set texts for a year group donated by publishers, Refugee Boy by Benjamin Zephaniah (Penguin).
- A Lit in Colour mini library

including 300 free Penguin books by writers of colour designed for all age groups, together with colourful posters and artwork.

• A reading for pleasure club where the texts for our mini library will be included in our Literary Society club in our library enrichment programme. We can't wait for our students to have access to this programme and our students are thrilled to have the opportunity to become more compassionate and inclusive in our school's attitudes and beliefs. We are more committed than ever to making the curriculum as representative as possible, to open up our students' minds to the world outside their neighbourhoods, and to ensure that no young person feels excluded by the books we teach and read. By having this exciting partnership with Penguin and a

host of fantastic publishers, we can work to inspire and empower our students to keep the drive for diversity in motion.

We believe that books create belonging and they help us to see each other and understand one another where they shine a light on different worlds and stories. We are so excited that our library is able to reflect the rich diversity of the society we live in.

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Understanding Refugee Week 2023

Refugee Week took place from 19th to 25th June 2023 and the theme this year was Compassion. Refugee Week is a UK-wide festival celebrating the contributions, creativity and resilience of refugees and people seeking sanctuary. Refugee Week 2023 invited people to celebrate what compassion looks like in action and show how arts and culture can help widen our circles of compassion. This event built on the five new stories written by Tom Palmer, exploring key themes for Refugee Week and enabling students to ask their own questions about the stories and Tom's motivation and practice for writing. Tom Palmer is an author of fifty-seven children's books from his Football Academy series to his war texts, such as the winner of the 2023 Berkshire Book Award 'Resist' which shines a light on the incredible work of the WW2 Dutch resistance. The tales show the plight of refugees escaping persecution by boat and cover different contexts and periods of time, from the 17th century to today. Year 8, with Miss Mayhew, Mr Chittock and Miss Carlile were able to take part in the online Q & A event led by Tom, talking with other authors who have developed the reallife refugee and migrant journeys graphic novel The Power of Welcome. All of these authors have been inspired by their own experiences as refugees. Some of these authors were Nadine Kaadan from Syria, Ada Jusic from Bosnia, Ramzee Hassan from Somalia. Each story has an informative introduction about the country, written by Bali Rai. Our school community has also been able to hear one of Tom Palmer's Boat People stories titled 'Denmark to Sweden' set in 1945 where he read his story to the Cornelius Vermuyden students during our Friday Author Talks. The students really enjoyed taking part in this live streamed talk with these authors and have even been inspired to develop their own creative writing stories based on the narratives they have heard during these events.

As part of the preparation towards this year's Year 10 Summer Sleepover at the University of Essex, Colchester Campus, The University of Essex Outreach has organised a 3 session programme themed "The Human Rights Project" for 46 Year 10 students.

The project's aim is to educate the students on the fundamental human rights of every individual irrespective of race, sex, religious background, sexual orientation etc.

Human rights are the fundamental rights and freedoms that belong to every single one of us, anywhere in the world. Human rights apply no matter where you are from, what you believe in, or how you choose to live your life.

Human rights can never be taken away, but they can sometimes be restricted – for example if a person breaks the law, or in the interests of national security. These rights and freedoms are based on values like dignity, fairness, equality, respect and independence. But human rights are not just abstract concepts – they are defined and protected by law.

The basic human rights have

some key qualities, agreed by the international community.

They must be recognised as:
• Universal: they belong to every

- single person
 Inalienable: they cannot be taken away from us
- Indivisible and interdependent: governments should not be able to pick and choose which rights are respected. Source (Amnesty International, UK).



Automotive Engineer

Automotive engineers design, test and build cars and motorbikes.

What you will do

You might work in design, development or production on:

- body, chassis and engine systems
- electrical and electronic instrumentation and control systems
- thermodynamics, aerodynamics and fluid mechanics
- fuel technology and emissions

You could:

- turn design ideas into blueprint
- research the safety, cost and environmental impact of designs
- move designs into development by building prototypes
- test products using computer simulations and physical models
- assess components' strengths, weaknesses, performance and safety
- plan the production rule
- redesign machine tools, equipment and processes to make new part
- monitor costs and production schedules
- oversee quality control

Routes into the industry

University - You could do a foundation degree, higher national diploma or degree, before joining a company graduate training scheme. Relevant subjects include: mechanical engineering, electrical or electronic engineering, design engineering, manufacturing engineering or automotive engineering. You will usually need at least 1 A level or equivalent for a foundation degree and between 1 & 3 A levels, or equivalent, for a higher national diploma or degree.

Apprenticeship - You could do a degree apprenticeship and combine learning in the workplace with doing an engineering degree at an approved university. Relevant degree apprenticeships include: manufacturing engineer or product design and development engineer. You'll usually need 4 or 5 GCSEs at grades 9 to 4 and A levels, or equivalent, for a degree apprenticeship.

Beauty Therapists Beauty therapists provide face and Beauty The

Beauty therapists provide face and body treatments to help people look and feel better.

What you will do

In your day-to-day tasks you may:

- give a facial by cleansing,
- massaging and toning a client's skin
- do a makeover by applying and advising on make-up

grades 9 to 4, or equivalent, for

Apprenticeship - You can do an intermediate or advanced beauty therapist apprenticeship. These typically take between 15 and 18 months to complete as a mix of workplace learning and off-the-job study. You'll usually need some GCSEs, usually including English and maths, or equivalent, for an intermediate apprenticeship. 5 GCSEs at grades 9 to 4, or equivalent, including English and maths, for an advanced apprenticeship.





Equalities Officer

Equalities officers make sure people are treated equally in an organisation by promoting positive practices and attitudes.

What you will do

In this role you could:

- identify equality issues
- introduce new policies and review existing practices
- work with employers to help them develop a diverse workforce
- raise awareness in organisations, schools and the community
- support community projects and groups
- promote equality law and events, like International Women's Week
- make sure adverts and promotions do not discriminate
- prepare and deliver training, presentations and workshops

Future employment – It is predicted there will be 3.9% more Equalities' officer jobs in 2027

Routes into the industry

University - You could do a degree in a relevant subject, such as law, psychology, sociology, community/youth studies or human resources. You'll usually need 2 to 3 A levels, or equivalent, for a degree.

Apprenticeship - You could do an advanced apprenticeship in HR support to help you get started in this role. This typically takes about 18 months to complete, and is a mix of learning in the workplace and the classroom. You'll usually need 5 GCSEs at grades 9 to 4, or equivalent, including English and maths, for an advanced apprenticeship.

College - You could get an introduction to this type of work from a relevant college course, like a Level 2 Certificate in Equality and Diversity. You'll usually need 2 or more GCSEs at grades 9 to 3, or equivalent, for a level 2 course.

This assembly provided students with a greater understanding of the myths surrounding gang culture, while also giving students a greater understanding of the nature of peer groups which are characterised by violence.

All students were shown the real life impacts of gangs in their communities and even had the fantastic opportunity to ask questions of Sheldon Thomas an ex-gang leader. We look forward to welcoming them back in September when they will present to our new cohort of Year 7 students.












Mental Health Awareness week 15th - 21st May
